Parish Update

This is an occasional on matters of concern or interest within the parish.

- There has been a spate of burglaries in and around Wenhaston so please be vigilant about locking your property and reporting any suspicious activity to the police on 101 or 999 for an emergency.
- The area adjacent to the bus shelter on The Street is looking a little tired and would welcome a little TLC from anyone who is willing to volunteer to do this.
- The telephone box is waiting to be disenfranchised by BT and at that point, hopefully the village will take over responsibility for it and spruce it up.
- At present, quotes are being gathered for the second phase of the playground refurbishment which will focus on sports equipment. When work begins, the Parish Council will be seeking some local volunteer labour to keep the cost down and allow more spending on facilities.
- This is an appeal to people living next to junctions with hedgerows that are overgrown. Now that the nesting season is over can you make sure that your hedge is sufficiently clipped to allow traffic to have an adequate view when pulling out.
- At time of going to press there are two planning applications in the system and these can be viewed on line at <http://publicaccess.eastsuffolk.gov.uk/online-applications/> They are 17/4172/FUL. Extensions to North Coign, Blyford Lane 17/4171/FUL Change of use of Wenhaston Quarry site to provide 63 holiday lodges, ancillary buildings and associated leisure activities.

Wenhaston Warbler Wine

Hardly had I finished last month's article when I read of research conducted at Oxford University, which showed how the perception of taste and quality of a wine was affected by the sounds of corks popping as the bottle was opened. It would appear that this improves the quality of the wine! Another instance of the ambience or the environment affecting judgement of taste and quality. Advertisers and marketing people have known this for a very long time of course and have used it to their advantage.

On to the experts; those with educated palates who write books and articles confidently recommending this wine and that. There is no doubt that some people have the ability to distinguish and appreciate subtle differences in aromas and flavours and this is seen with whisky blenders, parfumeurs and chefs. Experience and training will hone these skills and if the taster is to purchase large quantities and wishes to hang on to their job, then their ability to judge between wines must be accurate and consistent. They must judge which wine will appeal to a wide segment of the buying public at an affordable price which will leave the business with a decent margin.

Needless to say, they will often choose wines which are not personal favourites, but which they feel are value for money and will sell.

Customers are a varied lot and most are looking for something enjoyable which will enhance the meal or occasion. Others have taken a keen interest in wine and appreciate the sheer range of flavours and quality on offer. I liken it to someone who attends a WEA course on Art Appreciation and appreciates the subtleties and techniques of the works of art that they study in their local gallery. Whatever the reason we can say that different people have different tastes and I am constantly being reminded of this fact.

Neither price nor an expert's recommendation is a sure-fire guarantee that you will love the wine. As my wife keeps telling me "There are only two sorts of wine, those you like and those you don't". I protest that this brings us right back to square one. She ignores my protest.

Finally, in defiance of the above, I repeat recommendations I have made before if you happen to be looking for a juicy, smooth red which is not too heavy. These are Costieres de Nimes Domaine de la Cadenette from Adnams in Southwold and Truly Irresistible Pinotage from the Co-op in Halesworth.

Then there were the early rollers; at the time stone was extremely expensive and difficult to get so a Mr Budding went to Greece where he got permission to push down ancient pillars, and he used the marble for his rollers. The pillars were made in segments with a hole through the middle to place the necessary steel rod.

No gardening talk can be complete without gnomes of which David showed us a collection. A devotee of these little men made a mountain and stuck porcelain gnomes all over it. When he died his wife, less enamoured of them, destroyed them all. Years later one was found in the undergrowth and is now insured for a million pounds.
