Our swifts are on their way back from over wintering in Africa! But they need our help as their numbers are rapidly declining.

The UK's swifts have one of the longest migration journeys in the world, 22,000 kilometres (14,000 miles) every year.

To celebrate this huge achievement for our village's swifts, we put up our flag as soon as we spot the first

returned bird. We've got a new flag this year because the one in this picture was blown to shreds last

Swifts are loyal to their nest site and partner for life, returning to the same nest box every year, which is why we want to protect all nest sites, increase nest sites and advise if roof work or renovation is needed.



If you notice swifts nesting in your roof, please let us know. We issue swift house tiles at a small cost to residents with nesting swifts. At the moment, we only know of a few sites, this year we hope to map all the nest sites in the village. Email us at **wenhastonswiftgroup@gmail.com**

Our Wenhaston Swift Action Group was formed in 2018

What we have achieved so far:

- A number of private residents have installed swift nest boxes on their property
- Swift nest boxes have been installed at the Village Hall and Wenhaston Primary School



- We have carried out swift-count surveys twice every July since we began
- We have a swift flag which is put up on St Peter's Church flag pole when the swifts return and is taken down when the depart

- We have held two open gardens in the summers of 2018 and 2019 in order to raise awareness of the nest boxes and give out information leaflets about the decline in swift numbers
- We have provided information to residents via the village's publication Wenhaston Warbler
- Every year we hold a "Swift Pint" walk, open for anyone to join and takes members around the village, viewing nest sites and swift screaming parties, ending up in The Star pub which has swifts nesting in its roof (we will let you know when we can do this in 2021)
- We have custom made house tile "Swifts nest here!" which residents may purchase for their house
- We have approached site manager of new buildings on Blackheath Road who's agreed to install nest boxes

Why do we do all this? Because swift numbers are declining so rapidly that they have become officially endangered. The decline in numbers is due to two main facts, loss of nest sites and loss of their airborne insect food supply. Here in Wenhaston as with all areas, our insect numbers are declining.

What can you do? Install swift nest boxes and do everything you can to leave green areas for pollinators and wild flowers which provide food and sanctuary for insects.

Please don't use chemical insecticides, don't tidy your gardens and don't mow the verges!

Village hall news

Now that Step 2 has been confirmed at the time of writing, we remain confident that the village hall will be able to re-open on Monday 17th May as part of Step 3. This depends on the Government confirming the week before that the 4 tests have been met. We won't know the full details of the rules we have to follow until nearer the time, but it looks as if they will be much the same as before, at least initially. We are all set up for these so don't anticipate any problems.

We plan to restart the coffee morning on Saturday 22nd May at 10am. The chefs have been busy experimenting with new recipes to tempt us, so we look forward to seeing all the familiar faces and newcomers too who are all warmly welcomed. Sadly, we will miss Julie Baker who died suddenly early in March. Julie was a regular at the coffee mornings and several other activities at the village hall, and enjoyed joining in the social environment of the village. Our thoughts are with her dad John and the family.

The Cinema will be holding their first Blockbuster film evening on Saturday 5th June and the bar will open at 7pm. Full details of the film screening will be displayed at the village hall and on the village website http://wenhaston.onesuffolk.net/wenhaston-with-mells-events/

We very much look forward to bringing the village hall back to life after being closed for five months. Once we get further news about the regulations we have to follow, we will be hoping to re-start the Craft Market, kurling and holding some other entertainment events.

Village hall roof repairs

The village hall roof has suffered badly during the very wet winter and also during Beast of the East 2, when snow drove up under the tiles and melted down through the main hall ceiling. After investigations which have gone on over the last two years, the Committee have

decided on the only feasible and affordable course of action. The brackets for the solar panels need to be re-fitted in such a way which will prevent water ingress under the tiles. The panels will be temporarily removed whilst this work is done and then re-fitted. We hope that the work will take place at the end of April so may already have finished by the time the Warbler is distributed. We would like to thank the Parish Council for their generous support in helping us to fund this work.

During January the faulty inverter for the solar panels was replaced and this work was funded by private donations. Following the biomass boiler adaptions completed at the end of 2020 we are now using the free energy produced to heat the biomass boiler water tank, thereby saving money on wood pellets. Calculations show that since 1st February, over two months when the hall was closed and the heating was only on the frost stat, we saved 50kg of wood pellets together with a worthwhile reduction in CO2 emissions, and, once the hall is fully open, savings will increase.



Marsh and Garden



The lower part of our garden at

Marsh cottage is really an extension of the water meadow, only delineated by the old railway track and a hawthorn hedge. Every day we spot remarkable wildlife either on walks along the edge of the marshland or through it, and along the riverside paths. The wildlife sees no border and we can often see marshland birds from our kitchen window, without having to brave the cold wind that has been blowing recently. Some curlews have remained throughout the winter, and

their numbers have been added to by incoming migrants which have swelled the herd (collective noun for this species) to up eighty birds seen at one time, intermittently flying up and down the river and settling on the damp patches on the fields. The raptors continue to range around the whole area and we have seen the kestrel perching in our garden, looking out for small rodents. The sparrow hawk sometimes suddenly swoops in to hunt in the bird feeding corner, causing an immediate scattering of small birds.

Meanwhile the Marsh harrier and the buzzards, as well as a red kite, hunt over the marshland.

Despite the cold wind the flowers continue to emerge. The snowdrops have gone, and daffodils ('Lenten lily') are wrinkling up one by one, but now we have the dandelions and the lesser celandine ('Harbinger of spring') to delight the eye as we walk out.

All round the garden the beautifully shaped leaves of greater celandine are appearing. The lesser and greater species are not related, but both named after Chelidon (Ancient Greek) or Chelidonia (Latin) for 'swallow'. Both are traditionally said to mark the appearance of the swallow in Europe.

I was assuming that the swallow could not possibly arrive in England yet due to the cold weather, but amazingly, on the 6th April, we spotted two birds flying northwards, beyond the hedge at the end of the garden, and two days later a single brave bird arriving in from Africa was seen flying in the same direction out over the grazing marsh.

No doubt once the greater celandine blooms, we will see and hear these lovely birds all around our village.
