### **Improving Road Safety Through Wenhaston**

Complaints continue to mount about speeding vehicles through Wenhaston and the issue has often been on the agenda for discussion at the monthly Parish Council meetings. Over time a number of speed-mitigation measures have been considered but not all have been practical or economically viable. The County Council has now offered a number-plate recognition system which can trace speeding vehicles and report repetitive infringements directly to the traffic police. Appropriate legal action could then follow.

It is believed that the effects of the installation will provide an important level of safety to residents using the busy narrow roads and lanes of Wenhaston.

Initially the system provided would cover the roads where residents have expressed considerable concerns, but it is designed to be moved easily from one location to another. ### **DESPERATELY SEEKING BARISTAS**

No, not legal counsel, but volunteers to help run the community cafe.

For several years we have been blessed with our own cafe and this makes a very valuable contribution to village life and also to village hall funds. As with many businesses and ventures, the pandemic has taken its toll on the smooth operation of the cafe, to the extent that it is becoming increasingly difficult to staff the mornings. For this reason, it has been necessary to delay reopening on Wednesday mornings until September.

Manning the counter is not difficult and full training will be given to new volunteers which should take about ten minutes. Volunteering provides a good opportunity to meet local people and to contribute to village life in a very sociable setting and you can volunteer as much or as little as you want. Two people man the counter at each session and typically a morning's work is about two and a half hours which includes setting up and closing down. ### Marsh and Garden

When walking along the other side of the river towards Blythburgh, I see the intense green glow of the new reed shoots contrasting against the brightest colours of other living things. The blue damsel flies appear jerkily in front of me as vivid neon strips of light, alone, or as pairs, before they flit away. A migrant hawker dragonfly, displaying softer bright blue horizontal stripes on its body on a muddy green background, settles briefly on a nearby reed. A red admiral flutters past at a higher level, showing the contrast of red and black.


The buttercups have been everywhere for a while now, but still give out their yellow, seeming brighter than the sunshine they reflect. As I near Blythburgh, I see the small bright pink and purple flowers of common vetch, their fronds and leaves entangled in the

overgrown grass on the path verge.

As I walk, I keep a look out for the swans. I see six on the whole walk, two pairs, but no obvious evidence of nesting. Perhaps the breeding pairs are hidden deep in the reed beds. I hope there is not a genuine decline. Two swan carcasses were seen on the marshland over the last twelve months, likely victims of accidental flying into the overhead power line. Meanwhile the little egrets continue to thrive and I see at least four either stalking around or flying past. As I return home their much larger relative the heron flaps his way sedately downstream behind me.

Back in the garden, I walk over the uncut areas of grass where I have tried to resist tidying impulses to follow the 'no mow May' concept. The rewards are already evident.

Scattered tiny paler and darker pink flowers cover several areas: the dove's foot cranesbill and the small flowered cranesbill respectively.



They have different shaped leaves and different arrangements of anthers in the flower centres. Both named for the shape of their seed capsules which look like tiny versions of a crane's head.

We have had plenty of cuckoo flowers this year in the lower damper areas, the lightest of mauve flowers showing above the height of the grass. They appeared well before the cuckoo himself who we first heard late, on 18th May.

The cuckoo flowers are disappearing, hopefully to reseed next year, and scented mayweed and ox eye daisies are blooming, but the cuckoo is still calling out for a mate.
