Wenhaston Village Hall: COVID Update

At the beginning of July, the Village Hall Committee issued a statement advising that we were going to continue to operate under the same protocols and restrictions that were imposed earlier in the year. We said we would relax restrictions when and where it is safe to do so. We feel that this time has now come, we therefore with immediate effect can make a few adjustments. The relaxations are not far reaching however, it will allow us to take our first steps back to normality.

- 1 We have decided to continue with the 2m rule at the pinch point in the foyer
- 2 It will still be required to give tracing details and for hands to be sanitised on entering the hall.
- The wearing of masks whilst no longer mandatory, will be required on entering, exiting, visiting the WC and whilst walking around the hall.
- During any use of the hall it will be necessary to incorporate good ventilation, this will mean having both sets of emergency exit doors open and, depending on numbers of people, several windows also!
- Member clubs are also required to adhere to the protocols above and follow their governing body/associations risk guidance. Relaxation of mask wearing during activities is permitted if your governing body allows this!

If a group does not have a governing body, it should adhere to the risk guidance issued by the WVH Committee.

We have increased the limit of people allowed into the hall from 25% to 50% of pre COVID levels. This is still consistent with the Government 1m plus rule.

Please be mindful that whilst cases remain high, everybody still needs to continue to act carefully and remain cautious.

I appreciate that we have only been able to make a few easings, however we will continue to monitor the situation and will relax measures when appropriate and keep you appraised of any changes.

Wenhaston Telephone Box

As businesses claw their way back to normality the Parish Council can renew its focus on refurbishing the redundant village telephone box, which is now in a very sorry state. The council has received a comprehensive quotation from a professional company specialising in BT telephone refurbishment and Councillors will vote on this proposal at the August Parish Council meeting.

If accepted, the telephone would be removed almost immediately and the repair alone has been estimated to take several weeks. However, so popular is the specialist company, Wenhaston would have to wait until the spring of 2023 to welcome the telephone box back looking as good as new.

Note: For the technically minded, Wenhaston's telephone box is the illustrious Georgian-crowned Type K6A designed by Sir Giles Gilbert Scott. The type was manufactured between 1935 and 1952. **(P.W)**

Having been rudely interrupted in March 2020, it is with delight that I can announce the return of WEA courses to Wenhaston Village Hall. Happily, we are fortunate to again have the knowledgeable and entertaining Stephen Jeffery-Poulter, this time tutoring us on the subject of "An Historic Tour of East Anglia." In his own summary he says:

From gentlewoman Celia Fiennes accounts of her excursions in the late 17th century, via Daniel Defoe's best-selling book 'Tours Through the Whole Island of Great Britain' in the 1720s, to the enormously popular 20th century 'King's England Guides' of Arthur Mee, this course charts more than 300 years of change in the landscape and settlements of the historic Counties of Suffolk and Norfolk. Using the original observations and recommendations of travellers to this area in the past, combined with a wealth of period paintings, antiquarian engravings, vintage postcards and modern photographs this will be a fascinating and unusual perspective on the history of East Anglia.

The course comprises 7x2 hour sessions starting at 10am on Friday, 1st October. A break for half term falls on Friday, 29th October and the last session will be on Friday, 19th November. Many people are becoming increasingly concerned about the impact climate change is having on our world. It is easy to feel powerless in the face of such a complex problem.



Marsh and Garden

The riverside paths on the north bank were mown towards the end of July, making walking much easier. The thistles are still growing in



abundance. The Marsh and Musk thistles are joined by the larger less branched Spear thistles. The pink and mauve of these flowers contrast with the Yellow Ragwort, the Tansy, and Marsh Sow thistle. These plants are all in the same family, together with the Greater Burdock (with its burrs and dock like leaves), which joins its

near relations along the river as well as beside the barley fields. The main body of the Burdock flower sprouts many fine spines which each end in a tiny hook, forming the burr, and neighbouring blooms tend to stick together. This plant provided the inspiration for the inventor of Velcro fabric. Both Burdock and Sow thistle were traditionally thought to increase the flow of maternal milk and the latter gained its common name from being fed to mother pigs. Burdock also attracts several types of butterfly, and it was beautiful to see a pair of Painted Lady butterflies feeding on the nectar on plants growing along the path which leads from Blyford Lane to Low farm. As the bramble bushes flower along the old railway track path, the blooms attract many Gatekeeper butterflies. They are a light orange brown, looking quite similar to the

female Meadow Brown, which are everywhere in the garden. The Gatekeepers have a double white spot in the dark 'eyes' on either side of their upper wings, whereas the Meadow Browns have a single white spot. It can be tricky to tell the difference if they don't settle.

As the garden birds quieten and reduce activity, I go for a walk along the river path towards Blythburgh to catch up on how the swans are doing. I have been concerned that we have not seen any cygnets this year. The reed beds are much quieter as well, but I hear a few notes from Reed and Sedge and

Grasshopper warblers. Red Admirals and Peacock butterflies dance along the path, and also some dragonflies, one couple mating on the wing, settling briefly on a bright green reed leaf. On the path around the edge of Bulcamp hill I see Club Rush Sedges with their bunches of dark chunky seed, mixed in with the usual reeds. I climb to the top of the hill to get a view over the marshes. I cannot see any swans. On the way back I see a little egret flying over the grazing meadow, the only larger white bird seen today.
