Major Commons Clearance in 2022

For some time, the regrowth of gorse at the far eastern end of Blackheath has been causing some concern, given the cost to Suffolk Wildlife Trust of repeatedly having to cut the area to keep it clear. This was originally cleared by Suffolk Coastal District Council many years ago, but unlike subsequent areas cleared by the Commons Group and SWT, the substantial litter layer caused by a build up of 30-40 years growth on top of the mineral sand was not scraped off or reseeded. Unfortunately, this has meant an ongoing and losing battle with gorse regrowth due to the huge seedbank still remaining.

The intention in the early part of next year therefore is to start to fully treat this area, by scraping off with machinery the litter layer, and then where possible reseeding with heather seed harvested from other areas of Blackheath. Not all of it will be done at once, but the work will probably be completed over 3 years.

Suffolk Wildlife Trust

Taming the Flood – a Beavers' Tale, presented by Darren Tansley.

At the November meeting of the Blyth Valley and Southwold Suffolk Wildlife group, Darren Tansley gave us an intriguing account of a beaver project in Essex. Beavers were plentiful throughout Europe following the last Ice Age, but they were hunted voraciously over the centuries for their fur and meat, and by the sixteenth century they were extinct in Britain.

Climate change and flooding has led to an interest in the concept of natural flood management, and of re-introducing beavers to assess their impact on river systems. There are about twenty- five such projects currently in the UK, and Darren talked about the one at Spains

Hall in Essex. It is a joint effort with various Agencies to monitor the many effects of beaver activity. The landowner provided a wooded, enclosed site with a tiny stream, and in March, 2019, a beaver pair were introduced. They quickly set to work, establishing a system of dams, deep pools and side canals, creating a watery landscape. Dams begin as mud, to which small, then larger sticks, then logs are added. They leak, allowing water to disperse widely, absorbing flood waters in winter, and maintaining flow in summer. The beavers' huge lodge has an underwater entrance, making it safe from predators, and where two kits were born in 2020.

Water monitoring and testing is ongoing. Chemical pollution is captured as the water filters down. Run-off is slowed, and this is of particular importance to the village of Finchingfield below, which floods regularly. Initial monitoring shows that the beaver landscaping has modified the speed of flood water, making a significant difference to the village. In addition, the beaver activity has encouraged a much wider diversity of wildlife, and the elusive water shrew has been filmed eating the freshwater shrimps there.

Darren's talk generated lots of questions for discussion, and we all found it a thought-provoking topic.

Our next meeting is at 7.30pm, Thursday, Jan 13th. Our local Coastal Reserves warden, Jamie Smith, will be giving us the latest Local Reserve Roundup. It's at the Southwold Arts Centre, IP18 6JP, entrance is £3 to include refreshment. Under 25's free. *Penny Mansfield*

Marsh and Garden

I took a late afternoon walk towards the river as the light was beginning to fade, and as I went over the double gated bridge into the second grazing field a redshank flew up from the large puddle that has become a temporary lake, calling as it went. The water here is often deep enough for a

swan and attendant gulls to swim about in, as well as waders.

The leaves of the reeds have turned to a russet brown, with yellow and green tinges, and the seed heads have thinned. The bleached stems lie at an angle in places where the winds have blown them down. Now

the reed beds are less dense, you can more easily see warblers flitting about, as well as the river itself, as you walk along the path. Two weeks ago, when the reed leaves were still green and formed a more complete screen, I heard an otter slip into the water with a flurry of splashing, but I could not see it.



A 'herd' up to eleven of curlews is resident over the marshland, often flying around and settling on both sides of the river and up on Bulcamp hill, and it is lovely to hear their calls across the fields, often from the

garden.



Attracted by the brightly coloured fruits, I have been looking more carefully at the hedgerow plants that surround the garden on two sides. I have read that the number of species in a hedge can be related directly to its likely age. I had a proper look at two spindle trees in our hedge, amazed at how exotic the bright pink and orange fruits are. The spindle in particular is a sign of an older hedge. We also have hawthorn, blackthorn, bramble, hazel, cherry plum, bird cherry, and ivy. Nearer the house are the more domestic cherry, damson, and lilac plants. Of course, some mixed hedges may have been planted more recently so a garden hedge may or may not be genuinely ancient, but counting species can be useful

when assessing the age of farming field patterns.
The Michaelmas daisies in the garden were still attracting lots of bees and red admiral butterflies until the end of October, but the flowers are mostly brown now. Everything

is beginning to bed down for winter. The wasp nest outside the window is almost extinct and a few hibernating ladybirds are hiding in one of the corners of the bedroom ceiling.
