The end of the road for the 88 bus?

Konectbus announced at the end of January that it will be withdrawing service 88, the only public bus in the village, from March 31st. Currently it runs Southwold – Halesworth – Bungay – Norwich. The Bungay – Norwich section will close at the end of February.

The route started some years ago before 'Anglian Bus' was taken over by Konectbus and provided Wenhaston residents a link with Southwold, Halesworth shops and rail station, Bungay and villages up to Norwich. A number of reasons have been given for the closure but I'm sure that those who travelled regularly know that the service has become unreliable and lacking in passenger numbers of late.

At present Suffolk County Council is looking for another operator to run the service. There are a number of people living in the village who depend on the bus to get around and don't have easy alternatives available. Let's hope we get our bus back.

If you're not a bus user you may not feel this very relevant – perhaps a few more people will see that there are some advantages of using the bus – it's greener than a car, cheaper to run and you don't need to pay for parking.

From March 1st the bus will be cut back to a Southwold - Halesworth - Bungay service and on March 31st it will be withdrawn completely when the Suffolk County Council contract ends. Service 90 between Halesworth, Beccles and Southwold will also end on April 20th. I have written to Councillor Mary Evans (who will be speaking at our February 19th meeting) to inform her of this and urge that SCC invite bids for the service from April 1st. 

Old Wenhaston

An occasional series of extracts collated by Roland Hammond from old local and national newspapers, giving a flavour of life in Wenhaston and surrounding areas in bygone days.

From: The Suffolk Chronicle or Weekly General Advertiser and County Express

11 April 1835. ‘At Wenhaston, Suffolk on Wednesday April 22nd 1835. Six pairs of gloves will be given to the Company who shall ring the best 720 Changes of Plain Bob, on that musical peal of Six Bells. The Company of Ringers, Amateurs and others, is respectfully entreated by their humble servant, John Benstead. A dinner will be provided, Carpenters’ Arms, Wenhaston, April 8th 1835’.

8 July 1848. ‘G. Butcher, Corn, Coal and Seed Merchant, Wenhaston, begs to return his sincere thanks to his friends and the public in general for all past favours, and wishes to inform them he is become Agent to some of the best collieries in the North, for the sale of their coals, which will be sold for the lowest price possible for cash, at his Warehouses in Wenhaston, and of his Agents, David Newson, Black Shore, Southwold and W. Carlile, Halesworth. N.B. Cargoes will be unloaded occasionally at Reydon Quay, and Walberswick; one is now unloading at Walberswick, and will be up on the 15th instant.

16 September 1848. ‘East Suffolk Agricultural Association. The following prizes were awarded by the East Suffolk Agricultural Association, and presented at the meeting held at Saxmundham, on Thursday last:

- Class IV. Unmarried dairy servants for the longest term of service upon the same farm, with the largest number of cows: 2 sovereigns each - Martha Woodrow, Wenhaston, 5 years, care of 8 cows; recommended by Mr. Robert Adams, Wenhaston.
- Five Premiums of two sovereigns each, given by the Right Hon. Lord Rendlesham, were awarded as follows - Thomas Clarke, Wenhaston, for having brought up 5 children, the eldest of whom does not exceed 10 years of age, without parochial relief; recommended by M. T. Girling, Wrentham’

Wenhaston nature notes

In the garden of East Neuk on Hall Road daffodils are already in full bloom (February 9th). Crocuses have appeared beneath the great sycamore at the foot of the heath (the tree looks like it was coppiced some decades ago) and the new heath moss is a vivid green. It is a delight to walk on; its roots have a warm musty smell like a dog's paws. Dog owners will know what I mean! Snowdrops are now everywhere. Why does gorse flower throughout the winter? But winter can return with a vengeance. Last year a mild January was followed by 'The Beast from The East'. It was extreme but it did only last a week. Our daughter phoned from Canada last week to say that she has had temperatures down to -40 c plus wind chill!

The coldest morning of the winter so far was on January 31st; the thermometer read -8 c but the air was still. My wife and I walked up to Thorington via the marshes. The ground was hard and the low sun lit up the dried stems of last year's hogweed. Thorington church with its 11th century round tower and Tudor brick belfry was a beautiful sight.

There are more than 200 churches with round towers in Suffolk and Norfolk. As far as I am aware there are none in Lincolnshire. Why build round towers? - well why not? It makes sense when flint is the only available cheap building material. Square towers need corner stones(quoins) of good quality stone. Obviously, a round tower does not need corner stones and is actually stronger than a square tower, as castle builders discovered. Poorer parishes could thus build church towers with the flints they dug up in the fields. Stone could be imported in small quantities for windows etc. In Lincolnshire good quality limestone was available from great quarries such as Ancaster. In Lincoln mediaeval builders quarried the remaining Roman buildings!

Early mornings have been a delight throughout January. Before sunrise Venus and Jupiter have been splendidly visible to the South. For a week or so the two planets and the moon were almost in alignment - a heavenly sight indeed!

Wine notes

The Community Choir I sing in has recently begun to learn the Neil Sedaka song "Is this the Way to Amarillo? ". What has this got to do with wine? you ask. Well, nothing except that every time we sing it, I hear, in my head, "Show me the way to Tempranillo ". As most of you know Amarillo is a city in West Texas; Tempranillo is a red grape variety found mainly, but not exclusively, in Spain and Portugal. I suppose Tempranillo has stuck in my mind since our last Tasting Club Meeting when I was very pleasantly reminded of the quality and value for money of modern wines made with this grape. Everyone, I think, is aware that it is the main variety in Spain's best – known wines; those from Rioja. Tempranillo, sometimes under a different name, is found in other wines from different areas of Spain and Portugal. It is also being planted in the New World with exciting results. It is not an "easy "grape, but is quite demanding in terms of climate, soil and management if wine of quality is to be produced. It ripens early (its name means little early one). If harvested too late in hot climates it produces "cooked "flabby wines lacking zip and freshness. It is also sensitive to Autumn rains, absorbing a lot of water as it ripens. Aiming for low yields

and harvesting at the right time gives the best chance of achieving good fruit intensity and overall balance, Often Tempranillo shows at its best when blended with other varieties such as Garnacha (in Rioja) or Cabernet Sauvignon (in Ribero del Duero). The best (and most expensive) Tempranillo – based wines will keep and improve for many years but there are many youthful examples that are aromatic, fruity and characterful. Try Finca Carelio Tempranillo from Majestic £9 – 99 for a single bottle, £6 – 99 as part of a mixed six. Or, for about the same money (£7 – 00 a bottle) Marques de los Rios Rioja Reserva from Morrison's. Asda also do an Extra Special Marques del Norte Rioja Reserva 2014 for £7 – 50. Last, but not least, Tesco have Vina Cura Rioja Crianza 2015 for £6 – 50. They go with red meats, especially lamb, very well but also with pork and spicy sausages.
