

**We have a new bus service!**

The last 88 bus runs on 30<sup>th</sup> March to be replaced by the 99A starting Monday 1<sup>st</sup> April. First Eastern Counties will be operating the new service which will be a similar route to the 88, but with some notable differences. It will run from Southwold to Bungay, where passengers for Norwich can change onto the X41. In the other direction there will be a 'guaranteed connection' at Southwold where the 99A continues to Lowestoft as the 99. Fewer buses will call at the pier. It looks as if Halesworth Station will be served from Norwich Road; in other words passengers will need to walk

along the paths either side of the rail bridge to the north and southbound platforms. For the same reason I assume that patients heading for Cutlers Hill Surgery won't be dropped at the entrance. In Halesworth Durban Close and Dukes Drive will still be on the route. Basically a 2-hourly service.

From Wenhaston towards Halesworth/Bungay, buses will leave at 0800 on schooldays and 0751 / 0901 in school holidays, then at 1011, 1211, 1411 and 1721. On Saturdays this becomes 0751 then 1011 etc. In the Southwold direction buses leave Wenhaston weekdays at 0814 (school holidays) then 0949, 1149, 1349 and 1629. On Saturdays – 0949, 1149 etc. Note the 3 hour gap in the afternoon for both directions. First have produced a timetable encompassing all of this – it's available on their website: [www.firstgroup.com/norfolk-suffolk](http://www.firstgroup.com/norfolk-suffolk) under 'news and service updates' filename: FEC-CC-99TT03-19-Webv1.pdf I understand that journey planning websites eg 'Traveline' will soon have timetable information. Paper timetables will be distributed by ESTA (East Suffolk Travellers Association) as soon as available.

One of the reasons given for the demise of the 88 was 'passenger numbers'. I know that the service was supported by a few faithful customers who don't have any alternative, and the bus gives them the independence they need for shopping locally, and leisure and social activities. Young people going to school, college and work all need to use public transport. Some of us have different motives – maybe using the bus is greener than the car; running costs are less, no parking problems, or it may be that a day out in Southwold for a bracing walk by the sea is just what we need. Using the bus to catch the train means that there's no need to worry about leaving a car at the station.

There are a number of different bus passes – many of us are eligible for concessions and it's easy to apply - especially on the Suffolk County Council website – start with 'Applying for an age related free bus pass' – it'll tell you if you're eligible. If you don't have access to the internet, then the library can help with application forms. Or just pay on the bus – they're even starting to take contactless payments. Finally I'd like to thank ESTA for their

role in campaigning for better public transport for all in this part of Suffolk.

### **Wenhaston nature notes**

"Oh, to be in England... Now that April's there" wrote the 19th century Romantic poet, Robert Browning and he was spot on. This is truly a wonderful time of the year when all natural growth speeds up. The days are longer and an amazing variety of flowers are shooting up - Dogs' Mercury carpets the woodland banks and (at time of writing - 11th of March) violets are growing on Well Green, in Vicarage Grove and at the top of the heath next to Bramfield Road. Some very small flowers are a marvel of design - Speedwell, Birds Eye and Eyebright for example (I rely on my wife for identification). The common Dandelion, from the French 'Dents de lion' - 'Lions Teeth'- is beautifully constructed. We were warned as children not to suck the stems - the French pick them for their 'salade de pissen-lit au lard'. In the southern night sky, the wonderful star, Sirius, looks like a near planet. It is in fact eight light years away, about 70 trillion miles away and has a diameter of over 1 million miles!

Our winter has been mild overall, but the cold spell in March was a true 'Blackthorn Winter'. Our ancestors would have thanked God for the arrival of Spring, but it was also a worrying time because food stocks were getting low and harvest a long time off. In the 14th Century the Black Death (1348/49) hit a

population weakened by decades of poor harvests, cold winters and epidemics of measles and influenza. The population fell by 30%. A serious labour shortage led to a decline in arable farming and a boom in the production of wool. Paradoxically, exports of cloth produced much of the surplus wealth of later Medieval England which was used to rebuild many great churches such as Lavenham, Long Melford, Blythburgh, Southwold and the splendid churches of Ipswich. Churches were centres of devotion, community activity, entertainment and education. Business deals and legal transactions were conducted in church porches, implying that business must be honest in the sight of God. The Wenhaston Doom is a warning, perhaps tongue-in-cheek, to the tempted.

Many great families, such as the Norfolk Pastons had quite humble origins. Literate peasants began to appear who could employ lawyers to settle disputes and to draw up wills. Intelligent and educated members of this new class sensed a time of opportunity, and in this period we see the origins of modern capitalism. **Brian Withnall, Mylor Blackheath**

## Wenhaston WI March Report

Usually our speaker talks at the beginning of our meeting but as we were offered samples of pies to go with our coffee, we got the business out of the way first. Culture before vulture you might say! Kathryn Langford talked to us about her

bees and brought some of her honey, and gifts she had made from wax. She imparted some interesting facts: a worker bee only produces one twelfth of a teaspoon of honey throughout her life time; bees are the only insect which produces food consumed by humans; if the hive is happy the bees are less likely to sting. If the Queen is unsettled it can make the workers aggressive.

Truly Traceable Pies is successfully run by Lynn and Steve. Steve shoots the deer for the venison pies and sausage rolls. He uses all parts of the deer except the feet and hides. There are no longer any tanners to process the latter. All the ingredients used are sourced within an 8-mile radius except the flour which comes from Essex, and the samples we tasted were absolutely delicious. Steve talked about the different breeds of deer, the Muntjac being the most numerous. The Duke of Bedford was responsible for introducing Muntjac, Chinese Water Deer and Sika. The Sika is causing a problem in Scotland as they are breeding with the Red Deer creating hybrids which is not good. An enjoyable and informative evening.

The subject of our next meeting is Sutton Hoo. This is an open meeting, visitors are very welcome. Only £5 entrance for a first-class lecture, a cup of coffee and probably a biscuit. Can't be bad.

### **April birds – our summer visitors return**

---

April is a super month for birds as our summer visitors start to arrive, filling our gardens and woods with their song, especially in the early morning when the Dawn Chorus gathers pace. We've had a good start as Chiffchaffs were heard calling in the village in late February, a good week or two earlier than 'normal'. By April expect to hear Blackcaps, Whitethroats, Willow and Garden Warblers adding to the volume and variety of this daily concert. Some of the aerial acrobats, such as Sand and House Martins and Swallows will also be making their return. Do listen out for the Cuckoo. St. George's day (23<sup>rd</sup>) is traditionally the date when we might hear him announce his presence. The vast distances some birds travel to spend the summer here are impressive. The British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) has radio tagged many birds and tracks their journeys, details of which you can find on their website, BTO.ORG. A speciality is their cuckoo tracking project. Here is an extract from their entry on 1<sup>st</sup> February on one of their cuckoos nicknamed

*“Selborne”. “Selborne is in West Africa! On the evening of 31 January Selbourne’s tag showed that he was in west southern Ghana. From the information we received it looks like he took the shortcut across the Gulf of Guinea, a sea crossing of 689 miles! He is now 1,000 miles from his last location in Gabon and just under 3,000 miles from his New Forest breeding site”.* Given the incredible effort these and other songbirds make to spend summer with us, the least we can do is give them some encouragement, by continuing to provide food until our summer kicks in and local supplies are replenished. Nest building efforts can also be assisted by our tying up bunches of tiny twigs, dried moss, and other stringy vegetable matter near our feeders. Discarded dog and cat fur, from grooming, can be spread around our hedges and flowerbeds for them to pick up and weave it into their nests.
