

This bought the first half to a rousing finish. During the interval the Waveney Minstrels played, while the bar did a busy trade.

Strictly Come Dancing music introduced the next act with Claire and Ian Bigwood tripping the light fantastic (and not getting down with the kids) as they waltzed, cha-cha'd and jived in their Strictly NOT Ballroom routine. The band then treated us to a few well known sing-along songs before the other performers joined them on stage to sing a rousing 'Show me the Way to go Home'. What a show it was and the profits from the evening were all divided between the participating local groups who had put forward performers. 

Old Wenhaston

An occasional series of extracts from old local and national newspapers, giving a flavour of life in Wenhaston and surrounding areas in bygone days.

From: *Eastern Daily Press, 27 April 1904.*

Mop Fairs were formerly held at Halesworth, about a fortnight after Halesworth 'sessions' or 'hiring fair'. Hiring was chiefly transacted during the sessions, when carters adorned their hats with whip-cord and shepherds theirs with wool. The Mop fairs mopped up, as it were, servants left unhired during the sessions. The Mop Fairs were scenes of shocking debauch. Wenhaston had no statute or hiring fair but held an annual sessions or kind of 'frolic' on the village green, where some twenty stalls were erected. For a couple of days noisy merriment reigned supreme and there was much betting on donkey and pony races, that of course had as their goals two public houses, the Queen's Head at Blyford and the Star at Wenhaston. Masters were as degraded on these occasions as their men; indeed worse, for they were naturally able to keep up their revels longer. Some farmers would drink day and night for sometimes a week without going home, one after another paying in turn rounds or reckonings reaching £2 per round.

The village swarmed with low beer-houses closed at ten, while the public houses continued open all night. Of course, such orgies led to the frequent letting of any bad blood that may have been biding its time amongst neighbours, giving point to a saying still in use here 'Drink awmost ollus brings grudges to perfection'.



From: *Suffolk Chronicle*, 12 October 1833

Notice is hereby given that the Turnpike Road leading from the Four Cross Ways, near the Tollgate, situate in the hamlet of Mells, in Wenhaston, close to the town of Halesworth, is stopped till further notice, the bridge on that part of the road being under repair.

From: *Bury & Norwich Post*, 03 November 1824

On Wednesday last Robert Webb, Constable of Wenhaston, was fined 20 shillings by the Magistrates at Yoxford for suffering a prisoner, Abraham Jones, charged with felony, to escape from his custody.

Report for Wenhaston W.I.'s April meeting



For some time Sutton Hoo was thought to be a Viking burial plot but our speaker Peter Carter soon abused us of that notion. Sutton Hoo is an extremely important Anglo Saxon archeological site, as it is from the middle of the Dark Ages. Historians had an idea of life under the Romans as it had been well documented, then nothing until Alfred the Great. The finds at Sutton Hoo clearly show that the Anglo Saxons had a highly developed and noble culture with greatly skilled craftsmen and sophisticated marine

architects.

It is thanks to Mrs Pretty, who was living at Tranner House, that the site was excavated. After her husband died she became interested in Spiritualism, looking over her land she became convinced there was something to be found. She contacted Ipswich museum and employed Basil Brown to excavate the site. Many wonderful artefacts have been found (other than the well-known helmet) jewellery, belts, coins and silverware. A mysterious object was unearthed, great excitement! It turned out to be a roller-skate; it had been thrown into the pit by Mrs Pretty's son. An interesting and informative lecture, inspiring us all to visit when all the improvements have been made and the site is open again in a few months' time. Swifts are on their way back!

Soon after you receive this May Warbler, Wenhaston swifts will be returning from their journey to sub-Saharan Africa and back.

Last year the first one arrived on 6th May and the last one was seen on 5th August. Once again, they shall either be re-using their 'own' nest, or if they are young adult birds, they shall be back looking for a mate and a nest which they will return to in 2020. As soon as the first swift is sighted we shall again raise the swift flag on the church pole!

WENHASTON PRIMARY SCHOOL SWIFT NESTING BOX

A nesting box was installed at the school on 8th April in good time to attract returning swifts looking for a nest for the next year. This box has a camera inside so the children will be able to watch all the activity and have their own swift-watch in the classroom. Each child has been given a booklet which explains swift migration its nesting habit and the reason it's threatened today.

The school's nest box has been gifted in memory of my husband Mike Follows who died in May 2018. Mike was a keen bird-watcher and supporter of conservation and education so it seems a very fitting legacy. Thank you to Head teacher Julia Bowles and her staff for their support to this project, to Gary the school keeper for his help and to David for expertly fitting the box in situ. David has kindly donated his costs to charity.
