A Year Younger Than Her Majesty



Heather Phillips has lived in Wenhaston all her life. She went to the village school until 1939. She got a Scholarship to the John Leman grammar school in Beccles and studied there until July 1945.

'The war was on every day I was at school. I got there despite the railway line being bombed! I cycled from Wenhaston to catch the steam train at Halesworth that went to Beccles. Then I walked over a mile to school from Beccles Station.'After

school she took the same long journey back again. All this dedication to her education got her a place at teacher training college in London after which she taught in Ipswich, Rendham, Yoxford and Saxmundham.

Heather's great grandfather was elected councillor in Halesworth in 1894 when Parish Councils first were first started. Her grandfather was Wenhaston Parish Clerk for 40 years. Her uncle was then the next parish clerk for 40 years. It could be said parish counselling was in her DNA as Heather too became a parish councillor. She was elected to Wenhaston Parish Council in May 1955 (which was also the year she was married) and she has been on the council ever since.

She received an MBE for 50 years of services to the community in 2005 and she is still going strong. Could she be oldest continuously serving Parish councillor in the UK?

Heather has been instrumental in improving village life with such projects as the playing field, the village hall, The Footpaths Walkers Team, the Commons Conservation Team, the Wenhaston Millennium Map, the Jubilee hedge and much more besides.

She will turn 95 on 3 June 2022.

Heather has been chosen by the Parish Council to represent Wenhaston in the county wide Suffolk Queen's Jubilee Celebrations by riding on a rickshaw through the village. (Actual date to be announced) Heather's brainchild was The Millennium Map — a copy was given to every Wenhaston resident at the time. Quite a few still are still available FREE to any past or present village resident. They are currently stored in the village hall. If you would like one please ask for one. In the meantime we have facilitated six new households to obtain swift boxes through the Suffolk Bird Group and AONB. Thanks to Eddie Bathgate, Steve Piortrowski and Alex Moore da Luz from AONB from Suffolk Bird Group, who have been very helpful.

We have met with Mr Stone , head teacher of Wenhaston Primary School to discuss the swift box with video link and caller that was installed two years ago. This will be switched on in time for the arrival of the swifts in May. Two small bird nest boxes were put up by Jonathan Alder so that the children can observe other bird activity, such as blue tits, around the school.

The popular Swift Pint walk is currently scheduled for 2nd July at 6pm, meeting in the village hall car park, led by Alan Miller. To be confirmed in June Warbler.

The Swift flag will be raised as usual in St Peter's Churchyard when the first swift appears. If any of you spot a swift and the flag is not up, let me know via the swift group, e- mail address above.

Last year the first swift was seen on 8th May. Migrating swifts have been seen flying north in Southern Europe so it hopefully won't be too long until they appear!

Marsh and Garden

The grazing marshes have cattle on them now that the pools of water have subsided, and there is an abundant fresh new growth of grass.



When we walked towards the river, we turned to look back, and there was a large brown hare sitting perfectly still looking out over the field, its head with erect dark ears easily visible. Hares will be ready to produce the next generation of leverets soon, as long as they can find suitable land where they can find food and make a scrape in the soil to lie low in, hopefully keeping safe from predators. Over towards the reed beds there were a couple of shelduck, standing out with their bold black and while markings against the landscape.

They too will be searching for nest sites on the land, usually choosing abandoned rabbit holes to nest in. There are frequent flights of larger numbers of these ducks over Bulcamp hill, a good site for burrows in the sandy soil.

On the way back from the river, we saw at least two mice run out of our way into the undergrowth. Let's hope that plenty of small mammals will benefit the barn owl that we have seen on marsh.



Despite signs of spring, the nights can still be cold with frost and low lying mist over the marshes and garden. Along the hedges, the tubular white flowers of comfrey are out, but quite a few are touched with brown frost burn around the edges of their blooms. The purple flowers of honesty are appearing too, rather garish next to the bright yellow daffodils and narcissi which are getting past their best, not helped by the recent cold windy weather.

Guy thanked all those in the village who currently or recently have done so much to keep the Hall going through a very difficult time, whether volunteering in the café, helping with the maintenance, heating and cleaning of the building, or organising the various events that take place such as the cinema, craft market, quiz night, concerts, kurling, table tennis or badminton. He thanked the 100 club and the Parish Council for their financial support. Following elections at the AGM the management committee is largely unchanged. Wenhaston Wildlife 2020/21

March 2020 the Corona virus struck the UK, and we were all forced to spend our time confined to home, with any recreation confined to exercising close to home. This meant many of us turned our attention to watching the wildlife in our immediate surroundings.

The Garden Bird Watch Scheme. For many years the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) have run a garden bird watch scheme, which involves members recording the number of birds that occur in their gardens on a weekly basis. This information helps to monitor the health and population sizes of our commoner birds, and in recent years, this has extended to other garden wildlife, such as mammals and butterflies.

As a response to the pandemic the BTO opened this scheme to the general public, both as a diversion from the problems caused by people's enforced isolation, and as an opportunity to monitor a much larger proportion of the nation's gardens.

Wenhaston is fortunate not only to be located in a beautiful part of Suffolk with a wide variety of habitats, but is home to several very active volunteer conservation groups, Wenhaston Commons Group, Blyth Woods, and the Swift Action Group, and many villagers are members of organisations such as Suffolk Wildlife Trust and the RSPB. With this potential source of knowledgeable and committed conservation minded people I emailed the various groups, with the idea we could record the villages wildlife over the course of 12 months, to provide a record of the state of the village's wildlife in 2020.

Thirty-five villagers responded, and, on average, 12 people returned a weekly count throughout the period. A weekly newsletter was emailed out giving the recent count information along with othe local and national wildlife news.

Within a very short time the records expanded to what people were seeing on their walks around the village. Birds, mammals, reptiles, amphibians and invertebrates of all kinds were recorded, and these records were all sent on to the local records office Suffolk Biodiversity Information Service (SBIS).

Although the intention was to record for 12 months, Covid restrictions meant that records were received for 16 months, so two breeding seasons were covered, and results could be compared with local and national trends.

A total of 124 species of birds were recorded within the village boundary and 71 of these occurred in people's gardens. Records were only accepted for birds using the village, i.e., breeding, wintering, feeding etc. Birds of prey flying over are counted as they are likely to be hunting.

Rare birds such as turtle dove and spotted flycatcher were recorded from some lucky observers' gardens, and, away from gardens, tundra bean geese, great white egret, black kite, honey buzzard and woodlark were some of the many highlights.

Mammals in UK are always much harder to see. However, most of the species you would expect to find in East Suffolk were recorded, with two introduced species being the most commonly seen, grey squirrel and

muntjac. It was encouraging to receive several hedgehog records although the sightings appeared to be less in 2021 than the previous year.

Butterflies accounted for most of the invertebrate records, with 28 species recorded, a significant number as the county total is just 35. Obviously the most important species is the silver studded blue, which breeds on Black Heath, but there were also records of silver washed fritillary, a species that is expanding its range across the county.

All the expected **reptiles and amphibians** were recorded except for adder, of which there has only been one record in the village in recent years. Sadly, frog and toad records were in the minority and there were no confirmed records of either species breeding but great crested newts occurred in several gardens and were seen mating in some ponds.

A summary of the findings was presented at the Blyth Woods AGM, and from that has come the proposal to create Wild Wenhaston, an initiative to improve the village environment for people and wildlife. More details will be forthcoming next month. Meanwhile the report is available on the village website
