

Closure of Gate from Hall Road to the Village Hall Car Park Update




The Blyth Woods Group this Autumn

There has been a disappointing dearth of mushrooms in Blyth Woods because of the drought but on a dog walk to Vicarage Grove one of our members spotted these beauties:

There is something so alien and unique about mushrooms, no wonder they feature in our ancient folklore – and of course the edible ones are delicious in stews, casseroles and on toast. We, in the Blyth Woods group, are planning an expert-led Fungi Walk, but it will have to wait until Autumn '23, when we hope conditions will prove more promising for them.

However, what a bumper bounty of acorns, hazelnuts and beech mast we've had! You can hardly take a step without crunching on a nut underfoot. Our apples are smaller but sweeter this year, according to an expert from Somerset on the Today programme, and apparently perfect for making cider (he would know!).

Meanwhile, our other projects gather pace......

As part of an exciting on-going programme with Wenhaston Primary School, in October we collected acorns with the Reception class and planted them in the school nursery, and in early December we shall plant these out in Vicarage Grove with Years 5 and 6.

We are also having two Work Parties in the near future and volunteers are very welcome, even if you can only spare an hour. You need no specialist knowledge and all equipment is provided – as well as Elevenses with hot drinks!



Arctic and Sub Arctic Wildlife

At the October meeting of the Blyth Valley and Southwold Suffolk Wildlife Trust group, the photographer, Liz Cutting, treated us to a visual tour of Svalbard and Iceland's summer flora and fauna. The Arctic region of Svalbard has varied habitats of bog, rocks and cliffs, and is home to an amazing variety of wildlife. The flora is small and low-growing, but gives a beautiful carpet of colour in June, providing food for the smaller Svalbard reindeer to be found there. On land, the wildlife guide scouts ahead of the visiting group to check for the presence of polar bears: the area is carefully controlled for visitor and animal welfare and safety, but he is permitted to carry a rifle in case of emergency. Liz' stunning photographs brought out the range and beauty of the birds, from Arctic Terns and Skuas to Ptarmigan and King Eiders, to name but a few. One worrying photograph showed a polar bear carrying a plastic bottle, which thankfully it later dropped. In Iceland, it was interesting to see Snow Buntings in their summer breeding plumage. Liz was able to take clear photos of the protected Red Necked Phalarope – and the swarms of flies and insects on which



many contrasts, from the incredible colours and shapes of drifting, melting ice formations on the water, to the wild lupins on land,

look beautiful, but

they've become invasive, and something of a problem now. The exceptional quality of the photographs gave us a real feel for this remote region, and it was enjoyed by all.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, November 10th, at 7.30pm in the Southwold Arts Centre, IP18 6JP. Steve Aylward, Head of Property and Projects for the SWT, will give an illustrated talk on the Butterflies found on our reserves. Entry costs £3, (rising to £4 in January) to include refreshments, free for under 25's. All are welcome.

The Bells, the Bells

During lockdown I started the bad habit of looking at Twitter regularly. Amongst my interests is history and places where I have lived. From East London, a writer called the Gentle Author, who has a blog called Spitalfields Life, alerted me to the situation of the Whitechapel Bell Foundry. Through 2020 and 2021 I followed updates, petitions, crowdfunder appeals and recruitment of some of the great and good, such as Judi Dench, to support this appeal.

Why is the Whitechapel Bell Foundry of any interest to Wenhaston? Why, because 4 of the 6 bells from St Peters are from this factory, being acquired between the dates of 1767 to 1823 (according to the 1890 list by Raven, noted by Keith Johnceline in his millennial history of Wenhaston). The No 3 bell, from 1823, cost £37, 6 shillings and 3 pence, and delivery (cartage) was 6 shillings, a princely sum! The WBF is – sorry was – renowned as being the longest continuous manufacturing business in London, starting in 1570, and operating from the same building since 1740s. It is the foundry that cast such famous bells as Big Ben, the Liberty bell and the Bow bells. In 2017, the Foundry's then owners decided to sell to a property developer. A campaign to save the Foundry was started. If Wenhaston's church has 4 bells cast at the Whitechapel Bell Foundry, how may more church bells throughout the country must have originated there? This business, the 18th century brick building still standing and its cultural situation in the East End have a huge legacy. Supporters have started the London Bell Foundry together with a digital casting company, creating the End of Covid Bell for the Royal

Academy and designed by Grayson Perry, which will tour the UK. The planning permission has lapsed and the building is once again for sale; this grassroots group are now fighting to acquire it, and open again as a working Foundry in the East End.


