for the Blyth Woods Group! As the year turns towards its end and our glorious autumn becomes winter, we look back at some of our activities in 2022.

A Busy Year

We continued our programme of cutting and raking off the grass in the meadow areas and rides of Grove Woods to encourage the growth of wild flowers and other plants. Ragged robin raised from local seed and planted in some of the damper areas bloomed well and hopefully has seeded itself to increase in number next year. The central ride in Grove Piece had a wonderful display of vetch, birdsfoot trefoil, marsh thistle and other plants, all emerging from seeds in the green hay spread the year before.

Since we first started working in Grove Piece in 2017, we have steadily added to the records of flora and fauna found there. At our July Bioblitz and Picnic for Friends of Blyth Woods, we were able to add twelve varieties of



butterfly, two of pond snails, an unusual alga, Fragile Stonewort, and several new grasses. (Thank you for your help in this, Friends!) Alan Miller, our chair, carried out a breeding bird survey in Grove Woods for the third year running. Three barn owl chicks were successfully raised and ringed.

We made a bark area in Vicarage Grove to encourage fungi to grow next autumn. Meanwhile, our holly clearing continues there.

The young oaks in Grove Piece, planted by Wenhaston Primary School



in 2012, are growing well and recently the current reception class collected acorns and planted them in new beds in the school nursery. These will be transplanted in turn to Grove Woods.

The Wilder Wenhaston enterprise was born and progresses excitingly, masterminded by Alan Miller. More news of it to come!

The Butterflies of Suffolk Wildlife Trust Reserves.

At the November meeting of the Blyth Valley and Southwold wildlife group, Steve Aylward, from the Suffolk Wildlife Trust, gave us a wonderful presentation of the many butterflies recorded in our area. Steve is a distinguished wildlife photographer, and the evening was a visual treat of these beautiful insects, with close-ups that allowed you to see the details on the smallest antennas, or the effect of the light on wing patterns. We learned about the varied reserve habitats: ancient coppiced woods, meadows and grasslands, heathlands, fens and wetlands, and the returning of arable field to their natural environment. All of these support different species. Some, such as the Dingy Skipper, are in drastic decline due to habitat loss and climate change, but there are reasons to be optimistic. By returning reserves to their natural terrain, and with careful management, the butterflies have a chance to recover. There is a resurgence of the Purple Emperor in Bradfield woods, and it is hoped that this strong flier will find other suitable areas elsewhere. The Silver Washed Fritillary has colonised all over Suffolk woods, and are seen regularly in Reydon Woods. The Wall Brown, once so common but now in chronic decline, is making a slow come-back on the grassy verges at Carlton Marshes. The Silver Studded Blues are doing well at Blaxhall Common, but they do not fly far, emphasising the need for "wildlife corridors". We were left with a positive feeling that the right habitats can turn things around, which is something we can all help with in the way we manage our own gardens, no matter how small they are.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, January 12th, at 7.30pm in the Southwold Arts Centre, IP18 6JP. Adam Burrows, from Natural England, will be talking about East Anglia's Changing Coastline. Admission is £4, refreshments included. Under 25's free, and all are welcome. **Penny Mansfield**

Wilder Wenhaston pathway to a greener future

Wilder Wenhaston is a network of villagers, who have joined forces to help local nature recovery and improve our neighbourhood environment for people and wildlife, within the context of the wider climate emergency. It was established after several villagers identified a need for action. During the Covid pandemic several villagers carried out surveys with around 40 weekly records collated. As well as recording over 100 bird species (some were just one individual), the surveys also recorded a wide range of other wildlife seen within the parish boundary, however it did highlight how much was missing. No one recorded frog or toad spawn seen, either in their gardens or the wider countryside, and hedgehogs were confined to just a few locations.

Its widely reported how depleted our wildlife is. Climate change, urbanisation, pollution, intensive agriculture, have caused a 41% decline in all UK species since the 1970's, with a real risk of some species becoming extinct in the very near future. Shifting baselines has become a familiar term meaning that each generation thinks that what it's experiencing is normal when in fact there has been tremendous change in our wildlife experience over the years. Despite stating they are committed to restoring nature our government is unlikely to implement changes anytime soon, conservation charities cannot make change on their own and so it's down to all of us to play our part reversing this catastrophic situation.

This is where Wilder Wenhaston wants to help everyone do their bit for the natural world locally. It's proven that a healthy countryside creates a healthy population reducing stress and mental illness so it's in everyone's interest to take part. Wilder Wenhaston has several projects that we want to start in the coming months, working with villagers and landowners, that are suitable for anyone interested to join in. The first is a heritage tree survey where the aim is to record significant trees in the parish whether by age, species, or their place in the local landscape. The process of recording is straightforward for volunteers to help with but needs to be consistent. To this end a training morning is planned for interested volunteers on 4th December 2022, details supplied on request via email below. Other projects underway include surveying, mapping and restoring ponds and hedgerows; gardening for wildlife, which will include helping hedgehogs and amphibians through recording, giving advice, and demonstrating what works through a series of open gardens. Future projects can include planting wildflowers along our roadsides and field margins, tackling pollution of our water courses and improving waste management. The more of us taking part the more successful we can be, if you would like to be part of any of the projects, or have additional ideas you

would like to share please contact us <u>wilderwenhaston@gmail.com</u>. In time, it is hoped we will have a linked website on the village website and so if there is anyone who could create a site, we would love to hear from them.

Autumn to winter on the marshes

In the rain of late autumn a flock of Canada geese flew noisily across the corner of the garden which edges the grazing marsh. Resident here all year, smaller groups now form larger ones which move around looking for food from the fields and the marshlands. Various raptors continue to hunt over the landscape: the sparrowhawk plus the newly arrived peregrine falcon, both hunting other birds. They leave a similar scatter of feathers to mark a successful predation. I have recently seen feathery remnants of a blackbird and wood pigeon. The kestrel is seen often, hovering over the field looking out for mainly small mammals. Buzzards and the marsh harriers are seen over the grazing marsh and reeds most days, searching for similar prey.



A swan family with three large cygnets are now seen regularly on the river, usually towards Blyford bridge. I had not seen any cygnets this year, so it was wonderful to see them, having spent their first summer concealed in the reed beds. On another walk to Blythburgh, I saw a smaller family of two adults and one maturing cygnet waddling across the sheep field eating the greenery. I was lucky enough to flush out a bittern recently from the reeds, as I walked the river

path. It flew up looking like a stocky heron, with fine black and light orange tinted markings and a surprisingly wide wingspan. It made a repeated low pitched soft croaking call as it flew. It settled further along and flew up once more as I passed, moving over to hide in the reeds on the other side of the river. I had only ever heard the attracting visiting snipe, geese, gulls and ducks. The little egrets continue to stalk around. The plants which prefer salty and brackish water are multiplying on the grassland, transforming it to a sort of salt marsh. The birds are clearly loving it and finding valuable food to keep them going through the winter months.

extraordinary booming call of one of these birds in the past, but never seen one in flight before. The grazing fields next to the river have had shallow puddles most of the year, which are now extending,

Mr Geoffrey Steward Halls

A former local farmer and Church worker, Mr Geoffrey Halls passed away peacefully on the 20th of September 2022 in his 98th year. He was born at Leek in Staffordshire and wanted to farm from an early age. He attended Rodbaston Agricultural College in the late 1930's before working on the Home Farm at Ingestre near Stafford where he met his wife Christina. After renting a farm nearby they came to Suffolk in 1959 and took on a farm at Wissett. After a short spell considering emigrating to Australia, they bought a farm at Spexhall and became closely involved with fund raising for the group of Churches that included Wissett and Rumburgh, where they remained until they retired and moved to Foxhill in Wenhaston. Here they became very involved with Thorington Church. It was then that Geoff took up bell ringing and began a close interest in birdwatching. Christina had a massive stroke in 2004 and they moved to Derbyshire to access appropriate care. She died in 2016 but he remained in his own cottage until recently He was the ninth generation of the Halls family to be Church Wardens, maintaining close links with the local Churches to the end. His funeral Service took place at St. Oswald's Church in Ashbourne, and he left three children, six grandchildren and eleven great grandchildren. Derek Newby
